The new year at WRGN opened with the announcement of a brand new out-reach project. The "Press and Listen Project" was developed especially for sight-impaired listeners who are unable to read WRGN's new book, "Vision To Reality." Author, Shirley Updyke recently completed the recording of the book in its entirety.

The recording was then transferred to the MP3 format and the entire book is contained on one memory stick. It is played through a large MP3 player, which is easily operated by sightless people. The cost for the complete package is \$30.00, including postage. It will be mailed to those requesting it. For many people it is more convenient to listen than to read the book, and of course the audio book is available to them also.

The project has become an outreach in that individuals may desire to contribute \$30.00, the cost of a unit, which will then be given to a sightless person. After receiving the unit, it may be kept, given to another to hear, or returned to WRGN and sent to someone else. Call WRGN for details at 1-800-245-3688.

WRGN's "Press and Listen Project" is just getting off the ground with promotion starting the end of December. In our twenty-five years of radio ministry we have learned that it takes approximately two months of onair promotion before we have reached the majority of listeners with a message. Some people think that seems like forever, since they hear the spots every day. However, not everyone listens every day.

This is a project especially for the vision impaired, those unable to read Shirl's new book, "Vision to Reality." Shirl has recorded it in its entirety. An MP3 player, designed for use by those who don't see well, relays the untold story of the founding of WRGN/WIVH. Some listeners who are not sightless, but prefer hearing the book, find the project ideal for them, also.

At WRGN we have made this project one in which all listeners may get involved, making it possible for the book recording to be given to others. Listeners may cover the cost, \$30.00, and the unit is given as a gift to someone else requesting it. The player may be kept to hear again and again, loaned to others, or returned to WRGN for giving to another person.

Giving so others may benefit is not a new idea to WRGN listeners since they give monthly so others may hear the broadcasting of the Good News. You may call it sacrificial giving. It is good for all of us to remember that sacrificing to build the faith of others brings a joyous reward. Your giving keeps WRGN on the air and your giving to this new project will also build the faith of others as they become aware of God's workings in the ministry of WRGN/WIVH. "As we relate to the faithfulness of both God and the Updykes, the book really helps us to be thankful for what we have in WRGN's ministry," said a recent reader of "Vision To Reality."
