Interest in internet radio continues to grow as WRGN offers one of these radios at cost to listeners. "It took some time to develop a reliable radio that works as an internet receiver, but it's now been done," said Burl Updyke, WRGN/WIVH Manager. He refers to a model named "Grace," and it is this radio that WRGN is offering to listeners at cost, which is approximately \$130. The radio is tuned to receive WRGN along with hundreds of other stations around the world. The staff here is also offering assistance in putting it into operation. WRGN now can be heard world-wide on the internet and the internet radio allows anyone to

move away from their computer and hear the station anywhere in their home through better quality speakers. "Imagine no fringe areas for WRGN broadcasting. That's exciting," said Burl and he explained that the excitement he feels lies in the fact that it is now being possible for anyone to hear WRGN anywhere.

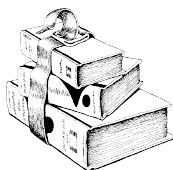
